Dear all,

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, of blessed memory, once shared that it is a losing proposition for a parents to ask children, "What did you learn in Sunday School today?" Why losing? Because no matter what actually happened, chances are the child will respond with "nothing."

Rabbi Sacks therefore taught that we should shift the dialogue, and we should inquire of our children, "Did you ask a good question today?'

When I first heard this, it sparked my soul. I made it a point to incorporate this into my meetings with Bar and Bat Mitzvah students, and I therefor require them to come to our first lesson prepared with three questions they have about Judaism. There are no boundaries to what they can ask, so long as they think about them. And each child has my sacred oath that I will respond to each question.

I want to share here examples of what has been asked over my 15 years at Temple Akiba:

Do you believe in the story of biblical creation, or in the Big Bang?

What does it mean to be a Chosen People?

Do I have to say something nice about my sibling in my

What does Judaism require of me?

Are Rabbis and Cantors chosen by God?

Do Jews believe in Heaven and Hell?

Why did God plant a tree with fruit we weren't allowed to eat?

Can my pet see God?

What would happen to Judaism if Israel fell? How many Jews would there be if there weren't a

If I don't believe in God, am I as Jewish as those who do? What does Judaism say about legalized marijuana? Did Noah miss any animals when he put them on the

Why is Jewish status traditionally about matrilineal

Can a righteous person who is not Jewish be part of a

Should a Jewish person who is not a nice person be part of a minyan?

Indeed, lots and lots of incredible questions. Each one reveals a light of curiosity. And the ability to ask is so much more important than a black and white answer.

What good question will you ask today?

From Hebrew School to Summer Camp

What our children can learn from Jewish Summer Camp

Hebrew School has ended, but Jewish learning does not have end for the summer. Jewish summer camps fuse the activities, friendships, and communal life of traditional camps with the lewish values, role models and culture our shared heritage. This uniquely immersive experience provides a confidence-building opportunity in which campers experience joy and discovery in a communal lewish setting.

Why send your child to lewish summer camp?

- I. Experiences first, explanations later. Kids are able to ultimately and immediately contribute to their lewish community at camp. In other realms of Jewish life, they are taught about Jewish communal life and then experience it. At camp, they experience it and the explanations come later. This is a uniquely powerful experience they find nowhere else.
- 2. Camp friendships last beyond the summer. Camp is one easy entry point into a lifelong Jewish community. Many alumni of lewish camp have found that the friends they make during the summer stick with them through college, young adulthood, and beyond.
- 3. Immersive Jewish community, 24/7. Campers are exposed to adult Jewish role models, Jewish peers, and Jewish friends from different places. These lewish connections in every direction are extremely powerful. Campers experience joy in a Jewish community, develop self-confidence as Jews, and forge Jewish connections that stay with them into their lives beyond camp. Nowhere else do campers have the opportunity to experience Judaism infused into daily life and reinforced by a community of exclusively Reform Jewish peers.
- 4. Camp ends, but the Jewish community continues. Extensive research in recent years has proven that children who attend lewish summer camp are more likely to identify as lewish adults and actively engage in the lewish community.
- 5. lewish camp addresses the whole camper. Children learn confidence, skill-building and socialization by living in a community. They learn how to manage in a diverse group of peers, and they face new situations and overcome challenges on a daily basis. At Jewish camp, adult role models and mentors create safe spaces for campers to grapple with complex ideas based in Jewish values, texts, and traditions - topics that secular schools and camps might not be able to address. Jewish camp is thus able to provide balance by creating space for spiritual, emotional and physical growth for campers.
- 6. Camp helps kids succeed beyond childhood. Camp is all about fun and can be an environment for "real-world" learning. Campers who return to camp as staff members can create opportunities to advance themselves professionally.

We look forward to seeing your children at Camp this summer.





Notes from the Tikkun Olam Committee

Sara Fields, Chair

As the new Director of Engagement, I am now chairing the Tikkun Olam Committee. I thank Cathy Penso for her outstanding leadership, and look forward to working with her in her new role as President of our congregation.

This committee was formed in 2018 to coordinate Temple-wide social action in accordance with our mission to repair the world. Our focus is on homelessness and hunger, immigration, and systemic policy change.

Prior to the pandemic, we hosted two well-attended forums to educate our congregation on the issues of homelessness and housing. We now attend meetings of the Westside Coalition on Homelessness and its Faith Committee. Through these groups, we have connected with a variety of nonprofit organizations working in this area. We have hosted monthly donation drives collecting food, toiletries and other items requested by the nonprofits working directly with people experiencing homelessness. Please see the box below for information on our July 2021 donation drive.

We support HIAS, which helps refugees resettling in the United States, and we recently collected art supplies for a center for unaccompanied minors. We have a refugee Shabbat service each year.

The Religious Action Center (RAC) is the social action arm of the URJ. We work with them and with the California affiliate, RAC-CA on legislation at the local, state and federal levels. We have developed a process and guidelines for the Temple to take positions on public policy issues and legislation, and this is currently being presented to the Temple Board for approval.

July Donation Drive

ImagineLA is a nonprofit organization that works to prevent family homelessness and equips families to maintain housing stability. They provide case management, economic mobility pathways, and wholefamily mentorship.

In August 2021, 44 families emerging from homelessness and 29 low-income families will move into the Missouri Place Affordable and Supportive Housing Community in West LA. ImagineLA will be the service provider.

To welcome the families, ImagineLA is requesting donations of new, unopened board games, playing cards, puzzles, bubbles, crafting materials, coloring books and art supplies. You can also write a personal note from your family. Look for the drop off dates and instructions in the weekly Temple e-news.




