Dear all,

On April 8, families all over the world will gather for our Passover Seder. It's our opportunity to read a time-honored text (the Haggadah), discuss contemporary issues, eat fabulous food (as well as some not-so-fabulous food - but food that would be missed if we omitted it) and connect with family and friends.

The seder grounds us with meaning and uplifts us with joy. The rhythms, the rituals, the readings, and the aromas crescendo with a symphony that embraces all our senses.

One of the most important traditions occurs toward the end of the seder when we open the door for Elijah the prophet. According to our sages, Elijah heralds the coming of the Messiah - the figurehead who will lead us all to a peaceful world to come.

But what if we don't believe in a Messiah?

Can the opening of the door for Elijah have meaning beyond the fact that it is a fun tradition?

Of course it can! Think of it this way....

Passover is our feast of freedom. But there are many in the world who are not free.

The Hagaddah is filled with opportunities to eat. But there are many in the world without food.

The traditions call upon us to link with family. But there are many in the world who are alone.

When we open the door for Elijah, we have to look beyond our table. We have to look into the eye of the homeless and the hungry, the lonely and the stranger.

I ask you now... Don't wait for Passover to open the door for Elijah. Open it now.

Open it by making donations to SOVA, MAZON, Shoes for the Homeless, or Miri's list.

Open it by inviting a new family to your Passover Seder. Open it by participating in a homelessness count.

Open it by listening to someone's voice from another political perspective.

Open it Open it wide And next time you look in the mirror, you will see the face of Elijah.

Cantor's Corner

During Passover, we read a number of special Torah portions from the book of Exodus. One is an excerpt from the portion B'shalach, in which



the Israelites have just been freed from Egypt and the miracle of the splitting of the Sea of Reeds occurs. Following this miracle, the first "song" in the Torah appears. It is called Shirat HaYam or the Song of the Sea. While most of the text in the Torah is written in long columns, this song is one of the few places in the Torah that looks different as you can see in the picture below.

Some commentators say that the text looks like the brick walls and pyramids the Israelites built while slaves in Egypt. Others say the text resembles waves, reminding us of the rolling waves of the sea. I see the text as a visualization of the Israelites crossing the Sea of Reeds. I see the center column as the Israelites passing through the parted waters which are exemplified by the right and left columns.

Not only does the text look different, it also sounds different from the typical Torah melodies that are usually chanted. It is a melodic, lyrical and joyful melody which helps to enhance the message of the text, one of celebration and triumph. This text is also one of the rare occasions that gives women a central role. It is Miriam that takes her instruments and leads the women in song and dance, leading the Israelites in the chanting of Mi Chamocha – Who is Like You God!

May this Passover be a meaningful time of joy and celebration.



HAVING A VOICE

I recently escorted the confirmation class to a seminar called L 'taken led by the Religious Action Center (RAC) of the Union for Reform Judaism. It was held in Washington D.C.

For six decades, the RAC has been the hub of lewish social justice work. It mobilizes around federal, state, and local legislation, supports and develops congregational leaders, and organizes communities to create a world overflowing with justice, compassion, and peace.

We gathered with 200 other teens from reform congregations across the country to study social justice issues that are of importance to both the students as teenagers and the entire Reform Jewish movement. The issues included Gun Violence Prevention, climate change and the environment, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender bullying, abortion rights, campaign finance reform, stem cell research and so much more....What made me proud of the Temple Akiba students was the manner in which they tackled these issues. They approached them with intellect, good conscience, and most importantly with Judaism. Throughout the course of the four day seminar, the students discovered that Judaism and the Talmud were the first major advocates for social change and that they are not new ideas or concepts, but rather ancient ideas revisited. The amazing thing about all of this is that this was not news to the students of Temple Akiba. Our students strive to live by Jewish values each day and from a young age have integrated these concepts and ideas into their everyday lives. When they speak about social justice issues, they speak as individuals, as Reform Jews, and as Americans. They are proud to be lewish and to associate lewish text and knowledge into their world of thinking.

They are the future generation of Jewish Leaders who live by Jewish Values, integrate them into their everyday lives and advocate for others to do the same. They have taken Judaism beyond the synagogue walls. I hope I will continue to see the inner light that shines so brightly in each of the students here at Temple Akiba as we move forward in our journey together.





News from the Tikkun Olam Committee

Turning Compassion into Action to Address Homelessness

Temple Akiba's Tikkun Olam Committee was formed to fulfill Temple Akiba's mission to repair the world. Since its inception in 2018, our central focus has been homelessness. We advocated for passage of Proposition 1, the \$4B Housing Bond for Veterans and others. Our first Forum on Housing and Homelessness in October brought more than 160 people to Temple to learn more about this crisis in our community and beyond.

The Tikkun Olam Committee hosted its second successful Forum on Housing and Homelessness at the Temple on Tuesday, January 28. Four panelists presented initiatives to address this crisis, then attendees broke into groups to brainstorm ways the Temple and community can take effective action to support these initiatives. Over 50 people attended in addition to committee members and clergy.

Karlo Silbiger, Chair of the Culver City Committee on Homelessness, outlined incentives the City offers to landlords to increase affordable housing and make units available to people experiencing homelessness. Jason Robison, Director of SHARE, explained their private-public partnership providing affordable, permanent supportive housing to disabled people in single-family homes. John Helyar, Outreach Teams Manager of HOPICS (Homeless Outreach Program Integrated Care System), explained SAFE Parking, providing safe spaces and services to people living in their vehicles. Lee Winkelman, California Organizing Director of RAC-CA, spoke about how the Religious Action Center vets legislation related to alleviating homelessness.

Committee members who facilitated the four breakout groups reported that participants were supportive and eager to take action. The committee is currently studying the various options in order to create a coherent plan. All attendees who provided email will be included in future communications from the Committee.
