I recently wrote signs of hope in my front driveway as the Covid-19 quarantine began. I wrote "What the World needs now is Love sweet Love" lyrics by Hal David and composed by Burt Bacharach. I was trying to convey that we should be hopeful for our future despite being in the midst of a health pandemic. On the sidewalk I also listed the names of those in our community who we are thankful for such as doctors, nurses, grocery workers, postal service employees, truck drivers, restaurant employees, delivery drivers, and government entities who have been working hard on the front lines. Many neighbors and passerbys stopped to take the time to read the messages of hope. It was encouraging others to take a more positive approach to what has been happening and if it helped someone have a more positive outlook then it served its purpose.

During this time of uncertainty it's wonderful to perform acts of tikkun olam for others in our Temple Akiba community that are homebound. I have created a match making program of younger families/individuals of our community to homebound adults/seniors who are not able to do supermarket shopping trips (who do not have immediate family in the LA area). The families or individuals are matched with a senior homebound adult and do supermarket trips and deliveries. We make connections based on where each person lives so it's not a far schlep. We have made five connections at this point and expect there will be many other matches made. We may have officially cancelled events this Spring but let's not cancel the connections between family and friends whether through phone calls, Zoom, Facetime, Google Chat, etc. We have an opportunity during this period to hit the pause button and reflect on what is really important. A Guide for Re-imagining Shabbat for 2020

A mini series class with Rabbinic Intern Daniel Freedman April 24, May 1, May 8 and May 15 Fridays 11 am - 12 noon on Zoom



Customarily, Jewish prayer books include a study section of the laws for preparing for Shabbat in between the Kabbalat Shabbat and Maariv (Evening) liturgy. Specifically, the second chapter of Mishnah Shabbat, which deals with the laws for lighting Shabbat lights. These laws, however, do not address the contemporary Reform Jewish community, especially in light of our new 2020 social distancing reality we are living though.

This mini class can serve as a way to help both a community and an individual solidify its Shabbat observance in a time when we all really need it! Join rabbinic intern Daniel for his last official teaching, inspired by the research he did for his rabbinic capstone for HUC. If you attended Daniel's Shabbat class last year, this more practical approach to Shabbat will compliment last year's more theoretical discussion, but by no means is any prior experience or knowledge necessary!

This has been a busy and fulfilling year for Membership. Among the highlights:

Particularly during the months while the temple building is closed due to the coronavirus pandemic, we are actively reaching out to our Temple community so that all our members will continue to feel connected.
- Work closely with the Caring Communities committee to assist congregants in need. Most recently, we have helped "match" older temple members who are not able to shop for provisions with younger folks who are willing to make purchases and deliver items to their door.
- Temple Akiba will end this fiscal year with a total of 407 Members and will continue welcoming those who wish to join even after this report is published.

Thank you to the members of the Committee (listed above) as well as the many volunteers who assist throughout the year by greeting, phoning, driving, schlepping, and always answer the "call" when needed. These volunteers are the heart and soul of Temple Akiba - unsung heroes. We are also grateful for the support of our dedicated office staff (Amram, Abby and Dina), as well as Rabbi Shapiro, Cantor Frailich, Randee Bishoff and Diane Germansky.

Whenever members of our community gather – be it on Akiba premises or via a Zoom meeting – we are always delighted to "see" you. And with membership renewal season just around the corner, we are looking forward to greater adventures ahead. Temple Akiba is here for you. When your renewal packet arrives at your door this summer, we hope you will take that opportunity to show that you are also here for Temple Akiba. We welcome you... we want you... and we need you... perhaps now more than ever.

VP Finance Annual Report Morris Zlotowitz, VP Finance

I would like to thank Amram and Dina for their hard work in maintaining the Temple's books. They have done a great job with our books as well as maintaining member account balances in our member database (Chaverware). I want to thank the Finance Committee (Mike Bauer, Bob Knopf, Susan Frazin, Wendy Miller, Stella August and Veronica Gursky) for serving on the finance committee and their assistance in the preparation of the budget.

New developments for the 2019/2020 fiscal year:

- A new money market account was opened with Bank of the West in order to earn a higher rate of interest on funds held in our reserves.
- The Temple's mortgage balance is \$720,751 as of March 31, 2020. We are soliciting proposals from our current bank (as well as other banks) to refinance our debt at terms that are more favorable than our current loan.
- As with other businesses and nonprofit organizations in the United States, the coronavirus pandemic has created uncertainty and challenges for Temple Akiba. We estimate that the fiscal impact will be an approximate loss of \$300,000 for the year ended June 30, 2020. This deficit is mainly due to the recent loss of tuition fees for the Early Education Center, and anticipated loss in collection of membership dues, religious school tuition fees and camp fees due to the impact of the pandemic on our families. The Temple has applied for an SBA Payroll Protection Plan loan, which if finalized and received, will help the Temple pay its employees during this difficult time. The Temple has cash reserves and we have also updated our budget to only pay utilities and other expenses necessary to maintain our facilities and vital programs for the remainder of this fiscal year. As we look to FY 2021, Temple Akiba is a strong and vibrant community that will overcome the challenges created by the Coronavirus pandemic and will continue to be the Jewish center for the Culver City/WLA community.

VP Development Annual Report Johanna Besterman, VP Development

Since joining the Executive Committee in July, 2019, I've had the privilege to work with my fellow board members and volunteers to develop and implement fundraising events at Temple Akiba. This year was the first to include our President's Circle - the highest level of donors within our Tzedakah society - who we've honored with a beautiful new plaque in the foyer just outside our Social Hall. While our planned unveiling celebration had to be postponed, we look forward to honoring our donors and continuing this special community of generosity.

Our 2020 Gala went on as planned, bringing over 150 members and friends together to support our Temple and honor congregants Sue Urfrig and Jen and Danielle Sheppherd. It was an evening of dining, dancing, schmoozing and celebration that also raised significant funds for our Temple Fund-A-Need. A special thanks to those who attended and pledged.

Unfortunately, as the Coronavirus imposed new restrictions on our ability to gather physically, we had to postpone our annual Purim Carnival and Silent Auction. We hope to hold the carnival later this summer, if at all possible. And we are thankful and grateful for the terrific collection of Silent Auction items we will have to help bolster our fundraising needs.

As of today, the newly formed Development Committee is hard at work setting priorities and determining a fundraising calendar for the 2020-2021 fiscal year. We plan to continue to host many of our fundraising events, but are also excited to develop new and different types of fundraising events. Our goal is to continue to bring our community together in fun and fulfilling ways where we can celebrate our heritage and our faith while benefiting our Temple programs and operations with much needed funds.

VP Adminitration Annual Report Jeffrey Reynolds, VP Administration

- We successfully worked with our workers' compensation carrier to update the characterization of many of our employees. The costs of coverage depend on the heaviness of the work of the employees, and we believed that this had been misstated by our carrier. As a result of these efforts, Akiba saved close to \$13,000, on premiums.
- New contracts were agreed with Cantor Lonee and the ECC director Randy Bishoff. This will help to guarantee our continued growth as a synagogue.
- Air Conditioning continues to be a priority for Akiba. The costs of repairs are very high. The bureaucracy involved in making those fixes is quite daunting. We had a meeting with the Culver City inspector and Viking Heating and Air. It was decided to focus our efforts on the Sanctuary and the Social Hall. This work will continue as soon as the coronavirus situation has normalized.
- We have started on plans to develop a Policies & Procedures manual. A committee was formed and has held several meetings. The goal is to document all of the important temple functions so that new people could more easily step into positions and know how to handle key actions.
- Attempts were made by email scammers to victimize members and staff of Akiba. The administration communicated security recommendations to all members to keep them from falling for these fraudulent schemes. Please be suspicious of any emails soliciting funds to be sent to individuals. If you have any questions about email communications, please contact the office.
- When the coronavirus crisis began, we cut back the staff's in-office hours. When government guidance indicated a stronger response, all staff were sent home to work full-time remotely. The office staff have been handling calls, mail, and email from their homes. Payments, both to and from Akiba have been steadily completed. All the time, our goal has been to keep any Akiba staffer or volunteer from being infected. The care being shown by all concerned is commendable.
- Plans are being made for future programming. This is very difficult to do, as no one can predict how the virus will affect the area, or what the government will do to respond. We are carefully watching how coming synagogue events might be impacted. We need to be vigilant because deadlines are arriving for securing venues, and we must avoid paying for something we will not be able to use. This is a truly challenging environment.
- Staff are being paid their full wages. There have been no layoffs or pay cuts. But we cannot guarantee that we will be able to continue this way for months. We are working with the Vice President of Finance to make sure that the synagogue stays within its means. If cuts have to be made, they will. Right now, that is not the case.
- Administrative functions are presently working well despite the difficulties imposed by the virus. This is far from an optimal situation. When it is safe to return to being an in-person synagogue, we will make sure that all steps are taken to protect your welfare. We wish you well.

VP Education Report 2020 Scott Markowitz, VP Religious Education

We at Temple Akiba are extremely blessed with the greatest Education team led by our Director Randee Bishoff, Assitant Director Diane Germansky, our ECC Teachers and our Religious School Teachers. During this trying time, we have done what the Jewish people have done throughout time.. PERSEVERED and continued moving forward. We have all been hit hard by the CoronaVirus Pandemic. The new norm is that of home schooling and constant Zoom calls (who even knew what Zoom was before)! I am extremely proud to work directly with this amazing group. Religious School:

This Year Religious School expanded with over 200 children in our programs. Since the end of March we have held our classes virtually. All our families have had the opportunity to participate in T'fillah sessions on Sunday mornings and classroom activities on Monday nights, Tuesday afternoon and Sunday Mornings.

This year Temple Akiba Religious School continued our Hebrew program called onward Hebrew. Our students continue to thrive and learn through this program. The students are enjoying learning Hebrew and we already see results with our older students as they transition into the Hebrew Lab and begin decoding.

- Students in K-6 learn language via Hebrew Through Movement. You will find first grade students following multiple-step directions spoken only in Hebrew
- You will find students of every age involved in t'fillot (Jewish worship) every Sunday our program meets. Students are comfortable in the synagogue, they are knowledgeable, and they feel at home. You will find the teaching of the meaning of the prayers is a focus of our program
- You will find our classrooms and hallways infused with Hebrew language Words on the walls, conversations about ritual words, and directions to stand and sit. Our students acquire Hebrew quite naturally with a focus on Jewish life vocabulary.
- And, you will find our oldest students learning to decode and recite the prayers of the Jewish people via a computer language learning lab.

As Part of our ongoing Religious School innovation project we continue to conduct focus groups and surveys to gauge the goals of our community for Jewish Education. We have narrowed the field to several core areas of importance to our stakeholders. These areas include; Basic Knowledge Base, Jewish identity, the school home connection, Jewish experiences, building community and examining ethics and Jewish values. These central values will allow us to begin asking questions which will shape the goals of our program. As we delve into these questions and beyond over the course of the upcoming year, we are excited to continue our exploration of how we can continue to innovate Religious Education at Temple Akiba.

Our ECC Teachers have been teaching virtually since the end of March and have been working extremely hard to meet the needs of the families and their students. They have made themselves available to assist in anyway they can. They have come through like troopers and we are blessed to have such a great staff.

This year ECC is at full capacity. All of our classrooms are full and we are almost at capacity for the 2020/2021 School Year. We have a graduating class of 29 children. In addition to our regular preschool programing we have focused on expanding our outreach to infants with our Tiny Tot Shabbat Program successfully capturing over 20 babies 0-2 each month for a Shabbat experience. Our Parent and me classes this year led by Assistant Director Diane Germansky have been a huge hit. We have already begun to form a parent group with those families who will begin transitioning to the ECC in the coming years.

- Thank you to congregational member Retired Rabbi Tony Holz for offering classes that expand our minds.

VP Affiliations Annual Report Cathy Penso, VP Affiliations

Thank you to the Trustees, Chairs and the members of the Tikkun Olam Committee and the Mitzvah Day Committee for their dedication this year to make a difference in the lives of our members and in the lives of those less fortunate than us. Thank you to the Board and Staff for their support of our efforts. Stronger together!

Tikkun Olam Committee

The Tikkun Olam Committee focused most of its efforts this year on housing and homelessness. We held two very successful forums. More than 160 people attended the first one in October, which was co-sponsored by the Culver City Area Interfaith Alliance. Experts in the field educated our participants and 8 organizations were on hand to provide information and opportunities for involvement. Our second forum in January focused on turning compassion into action in four specific areas to combat homelessness: Landlord Incentives, Shared Housing, Safe Parking and Legislation. More than 70 people participated, were supportive and eager to take action. The Committee was gathering more information on Landlord Incentives and SAFE Parking prior to the Coronavirus outbreak and had emailed attendees to ask them to hand out flyers about Shared Collaborative Housing and to participate in RAC-CA's legislative agenda.

The Tikkun Olam Committee works in conjunction with the Religious Action Center, the social advocacy arm of the URJ. RAC-CA's 2020 legislative agenda is in response to the Covid-19 Pandemic in the areas of Criminal Justice, Immigration, Health Care, Economic Justice and specifically, with regard to housing and homelessness, RAC-CA is advocating the following: Protect the homeless as well as renters and homeowners at risk of losing their homes

- Institute a complete moratorium on evictions, foreclosures, and rent increases.
- Provide rent and mortgage relief to those who need it.
- Provide emergency housing in motels, hotels, and other settings for all homeless people.

Committee members will be meeting virtually with our legislators, along with other congregations, to urge them and the Governor to support these priorities and asking the Governor to significantly reduce the prison population at this time.

Members of the Tikkun Olam Committee participated in the Culver City Homeless Count as part of the County Wide effort in January.

In support of immigrants, we had planned to have a Refugee Shabbat Service on March 21. That will be rescheduled.

Social Action, Sharlene London-As Chair of the Jewish World Watch Walk to End Genocide, Sharlene had begun to organize Team Temple Akiba for the Walk that was to take place on April 26. Due to the Coronavirus the Walk has been rescheduled for October 25, 2020. JWW continues its work to end atrocities throughout the world and to fight the spread of Covid-19 in these countries. Toward that end, JWW held a virtual gathering on April 26 seeking donations.

Mitzvah Day, scheduled for May 31, has been cancelled. We may do some projects in the summer or later in the Fall. However, the Red Cross Blood Drive will take place on Sunday, May 31 in the Social Hall. Please donate if you can. There is a desperate need for blood. Havurot-Efforts had begun to form Religious School Havurot, led by Dayna Greenspan. There was a lot of interest generated. We look forward to forming these groups when we are able.

Adult Retreat-Sonni Helmer had begun plans for a Mini Adult Retreat to take place during the Family Retreat in May. Sonni is researching a venue for a future adult retreat weekend.

Good & Welfare-Myrna Kayton sent 20 condolence, 35 get well and 9 simcha cards to Temple members this past year.

VP Youth Annual Report Kevin Knopf, VP Youth

Typically the report provided at the Congregational Meeting by the V.P. of Youth focuses more on the successes from the previous summer for both the Day Camp and Resident Camp programs And yes, I would like to share with you a few of the successes from this past year; but the historical performance of our camps will not be an indicator for the future. So while I share our accomplishments below, I have also included a little on our future.

So first, the 2019 summer program highlights:

Resident Camp

Resident Camp was a huge success with 115 kids attending (17% increase from 2018). I visited the camp on Day 8 of 12 (July 31, 2019). The camp was held again at Camp Whittier in Santa Barbara, near Lake Cachuma. Leah Penso has continued to grow the Resident Camp program to its strongest state, both programmatically and fiscally.

Day Camp

Day camp continued to thrive in 2019. We had approximately 222 campers come through the camp this past summer (increase of 11% from 2018). Not only did we have an increase, but the quality of the training for staff and the quality of activities conducted for the campers continued to grow through the excellent leadership of Robyn Altman

Our Future

So yes, we have built an incredible youth program through our camps and the phenomenal leadership of Leah Penso and Robyn Altman. However, the future remains uncertain for many things. What we do know is that our camp programs are crucial to our community. We should not think of them as profit centers or revenue streams, but as vehicles for building our community. For many Jewish adults, temple sponsored camps were the only thing that tied them to the Jewish community as kids. Our camps provide a service to our communities.

As we move forward into this summer, we are unsure if camp start dates will remain the same, and what camp will actually look like for this year. Both Robyn and Leah are working hard to identify what this future could be. We do know that as parents start to move back to work, camps are a necessary tool for childcare purposes. We also know that camps also provide an opportunity for our youth to develop a strong tie to the community and develop their Jewish identity. Temple Akiba's excellent professional staff and Board of Directors are working hard to make sure that as programs restart and are modified in response to the COVID-19 crisis, that we are doing so with the safety of all in mind. As a former camp counselor and director here at Temple Akiba, I can share with you that I am in awe of our staff and as a parent I am confident that whatever program changes are made, the health, safety, and Jewish connections will all be integral parts of the final product.


